

Cities, Colleges, Utilities Recognized for Keeping Community Forests Vibrant

LINCOLN, Neb. —Keeping Nebraska trees green and growing doesn't happen by accident but by choice. More than 100 cities, colleges and utilities worked hard during the drought to keep their trees healthy and strong. Collectively, they invested more than \$6.3 million in their communities. The Nebraska Forest Service (NFS) and the Nebraska Community Forestry Council acknowledged their work at the annual Tree City USA Recognition Day in Lincoln, April 2. Award categories include Tree City Growth, Tree City, Tree Campus and Tree Line USA.

"Communities are becoming more sophisticated with the tools they use to manage their tree resources," said Graham Herbst, NFS community forestry specialist for eastern Nebraska. "Tree City USA is a good tool in the community's tool box, which will be a starting point for the looming discovery of emerald ash borer (EAB) that will affect our tree canopy."

Five eastern cities received Tree City Growth awards: Battle Creek, Bellevue, Gretna, Lincoln and South Sioux City.

"These award winners demonstrate the enthusiasm and foresight to advocate for a community resource whose value is often difficult to immediately quantify and challenging to prioritize among the many needs of a community," said Amy Seiler, NFS community forestry specialist for western Nebraska. "Our communities continue to prove that for every dollar spent on planting and caring for a tree we reap benefits up to five times that investment."

Seven college campuses received Tree Campus USA awards. This was the first year the University of Nebraska Medical Center received the Tree Campus USA award.

Creighton University Metropolitan Community College in Omaha Nebraska College of Technical Agriculture Nebraska Wesleyan University University of Nebraska-Lincoln University of Nebraska Medical Center University of Nebraska at Omaha.

Four public utilities were Tree Line USA recipients: Lincoln Electric System, Nebraska City Utilities, Nebraska Public Power District and Omaha Public Power District.

The Nebraska Forest Service, an affiliate of the University of Nebraska, Institute of Agriculture and Natural Resources (IANR), works to enrich lives by protecting, restoring and utilizing Nebraska's tree and forest resources.
